Students then compete in a series of contests (School, Regional, and State) to proceed to the National Contest.

The mission of National History Day is to provide students with opportunities to learn historical content and develop research, thinking and communication skills through the study of history and to provide educators with resources and training to enhance classroom teaching.

Purpose: To involve students in developing a greater passion for the social sciences through researching topics and questions in various disciplines.

Format: Entries will consist of tasks/research-based (student conducted) products and may be an individual or group submission.

Guidelines:

- 1. Projects may be entered by individual students or by groups of up to three students
- 2. Projects are limited to a space of 30 inches front to back (depth), 48 inches in width (when opened), and 60 inches in height. (Additional support equipment may be placed under the table, but not at the sides.)
- 3. If a project includes audio or video recording, slides, computers, or a combination of these audiovisual media, the total listening/viewing time **may not exceed ten minutes**. Audio media should be presented in such a way that it is not distracting to its neighboring projects.
- 4. At the district fair, at least one student who worked on the project must be present to interpret the project. Students should be prepared to present a five-minute oral overview of the project to the judges. After all projects have been scored, judging team leaders must use information gleaned from interviews to determine overall winners from among projects receiving the same number of points. When there is no student present on the day of the fair to answer the judges' questions, the project is at a disadvantage.
- 5. All projects must be accompanied by a research paper of approximately four or five double- spaced typed pages. The paper should give the research question/problem being explored, methodology, research findings, and conclusions of the project. The summary paper must also include bibliographic references. If direct citations are to be used in the summary paper, the proper footnotes should be included.
- 6. An abstract of the project should be included on an index card. Information on the abstract provides a succinct description of the project, including the title, statement of problem or question, methodology, and conclusion. Students should give this card to the judges at the beginning of the oral interview.
- 7. The visual presentation must include the following components on a backboard.
- 8. Project components should meet all criteria shown on the Judges' Scoring Sheet.
- 9. The construction of the project must be strong enough to remain intact when moved.
- 10. Students must furnish all equipment such as extension cords, bulbs, projectors, recorders, and monitors.

In order to build skills in language arts, students need opportunities for authentic purposes in listening, speaking, reading, and writing. The purpose of a district-wide oratorical showcase is to extend a forum to young people to relate both cultural heritage and personal experiences in the format of a speech to a broad audience.

Student Selection:

The district showcase will begin at each school site.

Each school may present

- One participant/group from grades K-2
- One participant/group from grades 3-5
- Each secondary school may present two participants/groups from grades 6-8 or 9-12.
- ➤ We strongly recommend that each school site include opportunities for competition within each classroom, as well as within each grade level.
- > Students are permitted to participate in the showcase as a small group of up to 4 students in the same grade band.
- > Each school may select TWO students/groups as indicated above for the district showcase.
- Each student selected for the district showcase will perform in the district showcase.

Format:

- > Several format options are available:
 - o Poetry recitation
 - o Famous Speech recitation
 - o Dramatic Monologue
 - Public Speaking
- > Specific Guidelines for each format are provided on the following page.

All students must include an introduction (student's name, school name, and teacher name, and name and author of selection, if appropriate (Those students delivering self-created speeches may simply include this information in the beginning of their speech.)

Include a copy of the oratorical presentation whether original or from a source.

Format Guidelines:

- 1. Poetry: (Presentation must be from memory no note cards)
 - K-2-Maximum of 1 minute
 - 3-5 Minimum of 1 minute; Maximum of 3 minutes
 - 6-12: Minimum of 2 minutes; Maximum of 6 minutes



- 2. Famous Speeches (Presentation must be from memory no note cards)
 - K 5 Minimum 1 minute: Maximum 5 minutes
 - 6 12 Minimum 2 minutes; Maximum 7 minutes
- 3. Dramatic Presentations / Monologue (Presentation must be from memory no note cards)
 - K-5: Minimum 1 minute; Maximum 5 minutes
 - 6-12: Minimum 2 minutes; Maximum 7 minutes
- 4. <u>Self-Created Public Speech: (May use note cards; however, speech must not be read.)</u>
 - K-2: Minimum 1 minute; Maximum 4 minutes
 - 3 5: Minimum 2 minutes; Maximum 5 minutes
 - 6 12: Minimum 3 minutes; Maximum 7 minutes
 - Speech purpose may be:
 - o To persuade
 - To inform
 - o To entertain

Performance Criteria:

- 1. Adherence to time limits
- 2. Originality
- 3. Connection with audience
- 4. Memorization or effective use of note cards (note cards for self-created speeches only)
- 5. Uses body language effectively (posture, movement, gesturing)
- 6. Uses verbal language effectively (word choice, grammar)
- 7. Effective eye contact
- 8. Uses voice effectively (pitch, tone, volume, rate, pronunciation/enunciation)
- 9. Topic is appropriate for all audiences

The specific fine arts categories are oral presentation - solo or duo dramatic or humorous, boy's vocal quartet, boys' and girls' vocal solo, girl's vocal trio. One entry per school per contest.

Conyers Cherry Blossom Festival Photography Show

Purpose: 2024 Theme: "Conyers Creates" Photographic images should capture the theme and display student creativity, originality, and technical ability. **Photos should be taken in Conyers or Rockdale County**. The show is coordinated by City of Conyers Cherry Blossom Festival, Conyers-Rockdale Council for the Arts, Rockdale Piedmont Hospital, and Rockdale County Public Schools.

Format: Printed and matted photos will be exhibited at Rockdale Piedmont hospital.

Guidelines: Only new pieces of artwork inspired by the theme may be submitted.

- Each entry must be the original work of one student only.
- Print must be 8x10.
- Print must be matted using the RCPS white 8x10 mats.
- Framed photos are not accepted.
- Submit photo and student entry form according to your art teacher's instructions by February 16, 2023.

 - All matted photos submitted to Dr. Meng by February 16, 2024
 - Artist statements submitted to Dr. Meng electronically by February 16, 2024

 - Awards Ceremony March Date TBD; 4:00 p.m. 6:00 p.m. at Piedmont Rockdale Hospital, Building A

Requirement: Follow the guidelines for the exhibit using the theme "Convers Creates"

Accepted forms of photography include A single photo, panoramic, photomontage (one seamless print of multiple original photos), a multiple exposure, negative sandwich, or photogram. Original black-and-white and color images are accepted.

Non-accepted forms of photography include Entries with added graphics over the image, including lettering, are not accepted. Original film (negatives or transparencies) and multidimensional pieces are not accepted.

Consider the use of objects, lighting, and the location to show a clear relation of the photo to the theme. An explanation of the photography process/form might be a useful addition to the artist statement. Whether an entry displays use of technologies or a simple approach, it will be judged primarily on how well the student uses his or her artistic vision to portray the theme, originality, and creativity.

Copyright: Use of copyrighted material, including copyrighted cartoon characters or other such material, is not acceptable in any photography submission, with the following exception:

Photographs may include public places, well-known products, trademarks, or certain other copyrighted material if that copyrighted material is incidental to the subject matter of the piece and/or is a smaller element of a

whole. The resulting work cannot try to establish an association between the student and the trademark/business/material or influence the purchase/non-purchase of the trademarked good.

Criteria: Judges will use a rubric to select 1st - 3rd place winners at the elementary, middle, and high school levels. There will also be an overall grand prize winner. A "Piedmont Pick" award decided by hospital employees will also be selected.



District Youth Art Month Exhibit at Nancy Guinn Library

Purpose: The purpose of Youth Art Month is to advocate for art education in schools and provide an opportunity to display the artwork students have been doing.

Started in 1961 through The Art & Creative Materials Institute, Inc. (ACMI), Youth Art Month exists to:

- 1. Recognize art education as a viable factor in the total education curricular that develops citizens of a global society.
- 2. Recognize that art is a necessity for the full development of better quality of life for all.
- 3. Direct attention to the value of art education for divergent and critical thinking.
- 4. Expand art programs in schools and stimulate new art programs.
- 5. Encourage commitment to the arts by students, community organizations, and individuals everywhere.
- 6. Provide additional opportunities for individuals of all ages to participate in creative art learning.
- 7. Increase community, business, and governmental support for art education.
- 8. Increase community understanding and interest in art and art education through involvement in art exhibits, workshops, and other creative ventures.
- 9. Reflect and demonstrate the goals of the National Art Education Association that work toward the improvement of art education at all levels. Youth Art Month (YAM) National Art Education Association (arteducators.org)

Format: In person exhibit of matted artwork submitted by RCPS art teachers. Each teacher may submit up to 10 pieces of artwork with artist statements.

February 16, 2024: All artwork to Dr. Meng from each school.

February 16, 2024: Forms for all artwork submitted electronically to Dr. Meng from each school.

March 4, 2024 Work hung at Nancy Guin Library

March 4 - 29, 2024: Work on display at the library

March 2024: Reception at Nancy Guin Library 5:00 p.m. - 7:00 p.m.

March 29, 2024: all work must be taken down

Guidelines: There is no theme for this exhibit. The work should be appropriate for display in a public location where the audience will include all ages.

Requirement: All artwork should be created by RCPS students in grades PreK - 12 during the 2023-2024 school year. Artwork should be original and adhere to standard rules regarding plagiarism and copyright. Most art should be 9 x 12 or 12 x 18 with no artwork larger than 18 x 24. Mats should be the lightweight mats supplied by Dr. Meng. The displays will not hold professionally matted pieces that include foam core.



Scholastic Art Awards

Purpose: "The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards were founded in 1923 and, for nearly a century, have inspired bold ideas in creative teens throughout the country." This is by far the most prestigious art competition in the country and an opportunity for students to compete for awards and scholarships at top Art colleges and universities across the country.

Format: Enter online. Savannah College of Art and Design hosts the regional competition for Georgia. Students will be notified of winning work and the physical work must be sent to SCAD Savannah for the Scholastic Art Awards Regional Exhibition.

Guidelines: Create an account online. Review plagiarism and copyright information. Pay entry fee or apply for a waiver. Click here for more information on how to enter. How to Enter | Scholastic Art and Writing Awards Deadline for 2024 entries is not yet posted but should be posted soon and should be around mid-December.

Requirement: Scholastic Art Awards are open to students in Grades 7 - 12. Students may submit on their own or Georgia teachers may submit student work.

Criteria: Entries are selected for awards without knowledge of the student's gender, age, ethnicity, or hometown by some of the foremost leaders in the visual and literary arts. Jurors look for works that exemplify the Awards' core values: originality, technical skill, and the emergence of a personal voice or vision.

ORIGINALITY

Work that breaks from convention, blurs the boundaries between genres, and challenges notions of how a particular concept or emotion can be expressed.

TECHNICAL SKILL

Work that uses techniques to advance an original perspective or a personal vision or voice, and shows skills being utilized to create something unique, powerful, and innovative.

EMERGENCE OF A PERSONAL VOICE OR VISION

Work with an authentic and unique point of view and style.

Congressional Art Competition

Purpose: Each year this national competition calls upon high school students of all backgrounds and skill sets to submit their art for the chance to display their winning pieces in their congressional district and in the U.S. Capitol. The winning work of art will hang in the tunnel from the Congressional Offices to the Capitol for one year. Scholarships and other prizes are also up for grabs.

Format: Guidelines have not been updated for the 2024 competition. These are the guidelines from 2023: Due to COVID and to keep the students, teachers, parents, judges, and congressional team members safe, all artworks will be submitted online. Submit a clear photo of your artwork along with your completed application. We recommend that the photo of your artwork is taken in a space that has excellent artificial lighting or taken with natural lighting (outside.) Please be sure to capture the entire art piece while also capturing the detail and color of your artwork.

Guidelines: There may be a theme for this art competition. Only two-dimensional art is eligible for this competition. Work should not exceed 18" x 24" plus mat. Each student is allowed no more than two entries.

Eligible artwork includes the following:

Paintings: oil, acrylics, watercolor, etc.

- Drawings: pastels, colored pencil, pencil, charcoal, ink, markers
- Collages: must be two dimensional
- Prints: lithographs, silkscreen, block prints
- Mixed Media: use of more than two mediums such as pencil, ink, etc.
- Computer-Generated Art
- Photography
